The Institute of Learning in Retirement is a group of retirement age active seniors who are committed to life-long learning. Based at the Virginia Beach campus of Tidewater Community College, we enjoy intellectually stimulating lectures, discussion groups, social events, and trips. For a yearly membership fee, you will receive quarterly schedules of our activities. Classes, trips, discussion groups, and socials require registration and payment.

There are over 300 such college-sponsored institutes and centers in the U.S., and we are one of the largest in Virginia. Our ILR began in 1993 with 15 interested members, and has had as many as 900 active members from Virginia Beach and surrounding cities. We are housed at the Virginia Beach campus of Tidewater Community College and are in partnership with the Virginia Library system.

Membership

ILR membership is open to all who have reached retirement age without regard to race, religion, gender, color, or national origin. Volunteers interested in enriching their retirement years run the organization, with the help of one employee who sees to the business of operation.

What does it cost?

ILR members pay an annual membership fee of \$20. Each class selected costs \$14 per two-hour session. The ILR social, membership, and travel events are priced accordingly.

Programs

The schedule for classes and trips is offered by quarters (Jan-Mar, Apr-Jun, Jul-Sep, Oct-Dec). Members can register for programs as soon as the schedule is mailed or posted on the ILR website. (ilrvb.org > current forms & flyers)

Members register for the classes and activities that interest them. Topics are drawn from the arts, social issues, science and technology, history and world affairs, and health-related subjects. ILR also has special interest groups that organize as members express interest, such as Siteseers, who discuss international travel, the ILR Book Group, and Great Decisions. Call the office for contact information about these groups.

Our classes are usually two-hour presentations. Each calendar quarter, ILR offers 15 to 20 different classes planned by our Curriculum Committee. Classes meet Monday through Thursday in either the morning (10-12) or afternoon (1-3). Area college and university faculty teach many of our classes, but area experts and our members deliver others. **All classes are taught on the TCC Virginia Beach Campus and/or Zoom** unless otherwise specified. (See Registration form for Location details.) Specific room numbers are provided immediately prior to the class date.

Social and Travel Opportunities

Socializing is an important aspect of ILR. The Social Committee plans luncheons, visits to museums, and holiday events. The Membership Committee organizes periodic Lunch & Learn gatherings and New-Member Get-Togethers. The Travel Committee plans both day and overnight bus trips.

Class Cancellations

If a member cancels a class by phone or email *at least 4 business days in advance*, during business hours (9:30-3:30p.m., M-F), the member may choose either a full-value account credit or a refund check minus a \$2 administrative fee. Course Title: **The Best of the Best: Peregrine Falcons and Bald Eagles**

Date and Time: Monday, April 3, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: The first hour of this presentation will feature the description, behavior, nest sites, history, distribution, recovery and current status of the peregrine falcon in Virginia with a focus on the Tidewater and Eastern Regions. The second hour will feature the Bald Eagle, only found in North America. In 1972 the human use of pesticides like DDT resulted in only 32 known pairs of breeding Bald Eagles in Virginia, and none in Hampton Roads. Today in Virginia there are over 1,000 breeding pairs. We will cover the conservation, behavior, habits, diet, research efforts and description of the Bald Eagle.

Speaker: **Reese F. Lukei, Jr.** has been active in the wildlife community for over 30 years. He started volunteering for the Center for Conservation Biology in the mid-1990s as a lead hawk trapper on the Eastern Shore of Virginia. Reese currently monitors eagle and osprey populations in the lower tidewater area of Virginia, including the pair of eagles at the Norfolk Botanical Gardens. He writes two blogs on the Norfolk eagles: Eagle Nest and Eagle Trak. He also serves on the Board of Directors for the Back Bay National Wildlife Refuge Society.



Course Title: **Pirates and Privateers**

Date and Time: Wednesday, April 5, 2023, 10:00- 12:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: Discuss the subtle difference between Pirates and Privateers. Learn about the “Golden Age of Piracy” and discover what 20th century U. S. President hired a privateer in time of war. Speaker will be in costume.

Speaker: **Al Chewing** is a Virginia native and retired Virginia Beach Fire Captain, small business owner, actor, author, historian, master storyteller.



Course Title: **Presence of Mr. Rogers: Preserving Our Humanity in the Digital Age**

Date and Time: Monday, April 10, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: For thirty-three years, Fred Rogers opened each episode of *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood* with a cheerful smile and heartfelt invitation with his theme song, “Won’t You Be My Neighbor?” In the moral and spiritual sense, a Neighbor entails a kind of *presence* which expresses care, compassion, and unconditional acceptance. With Mr. Rogers’ deep concern about television’s potentially harmful effects on children and society, we will examine the values of Rogers’ contributions at a time when education is increasingly shifting to remote platforms and the pervasiveness of digital technology and media. There is much to learn about how to preserve humanity in this digital age.

Speaker: **Dr. Steven Emmanuel** is the Dean of the Susan B. Goode School of Arts and Humanities at Virginia Wesleyan University. He received his Ph.D. from Brown University and a BA from Boston University. He was a Fulbright Fellow at the University of Copenhagen from 1985-1986.



Course Title: 26 Years: An Orientation to the American Revolution

Date and Time: Thursday, April 13, 2023, 1:00 – 3:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: This class will be Randy Flood’s overview of the entire Revolutionary War: 1763 – 1789. Randy is going back to the beginning and summarizing all that we have learned. This is a great way to review the overall picture.

Speaker: Randy Flood is a historian and co-founder of The *Real* American Revolution, a nonprofit organization established to educate citizens about the American Revolution. Professionally, Randy began his career by serving on the staff of the United States Senate and has taught courses about politics and the legislative processes at numerous colleges and universities in the Washington metropolitan area. Currently he resides in Williamsburg, Virginia, where he is working with the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Association to educate teachers, students and communities about the national historic trail that Generals Washington and Rochambeau and their armies traveled to entrap Lord Cornwallis and his British Army at Yorktown.



Course Title: The Chesapeake Bay Foundation’s Dedication to Save the Bay

Date and Time: Monday, April 17, 2023, 1:00 – 3:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: Learn all about what the largest organization dedicated to saving the Chesapeake Bay does right here in Hampton Roads and the entire watershed. Find out what the many issues are affecting our waterways and what the solutions are. From advocacy to restoration, there is something each of us can do.

Speaker: Cindy Watts, Ph.D., is a Professor Emeritus at Virginia Commonwealth University. A native of Washington State, she grew up on Henderson Inlet in Puget Sound. Cindy received a Ph.D. in Political Economy at the Johns Hopkins University, and spent 40 years teaching health economics and health policy at the University of Washington and VCU before “retiring” in 2021. She continues to teach, recently a course in climate change, health and health care at VCU and the University of Richmond. Cindy participated in the Hampton Roads Chesapeake Bay Foundation Voices program, and became a CBF Clean Water Captain in 2022. Her home is at the banks of the Diascund Creek, a tributary of the Chickahominy and James Rivers.



Course Title: The Most Famous Explorer You’ve Probably Never Heard Of

Date and Time: Wednesday, April 19, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: Largely forgotten by history, the explorer who named Cape Cod and Martha’s Vineyard was also one of the three captains who sailed to Jamestown in 1607. Without the necessary funding he secured, that journey might not have happened when it did. Introducing a lost hero ... Bartholomew Gosnold.

Speaker: Lillie Gilbert is an author, activist, champion canoeist, conservationist and explorer. She was educated at William and Mary. Several of her books are about local trails and waterways. Lillie first volunteered as a member of the Parks & Recreation Commission in 1992 and put her knowledge to work through various activities.



Course Title: Personal Railcars of the Rich and Famous: Yesteryear's Lear Jets

Date and Time: Monday, April 24, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: We will explore the phenomenon of elite individuals and companies commissioning, buying and using their personal railroad cars for privacy, luxury, and entertaining. Private train cars were popular before they were relegated to a footnote in history by private planes and private jets. Walter Chrysler had one for family and business travel and to loan to friends. Some presidents, celebrities, industrialists and CEOs owned railroad cars, especially if they owned railroad interests. We will also discuss the companies who built them, their costs, design and integration into the public and private rail systems. Finally, we will discuss how you can lease or rent a railcar today.

Speaker: Dr. Robert Baxter is a native of Tidewater Virginia and currently a volunteer Contact Ranger & Historical Interpreter with False Cape and First Landing State Parks, and the Virginia Association of Parks. He holds a Doctorate and Master's Degree of Education from UVA, and a B.A. in History from ODU. Half of this graduate work was in History. His postdoctoral work at the University of Dayton was in educational technology. He was Assistant Dean & Instructor at UVA. He was formerly VP of a local technology company serving a variety of clients including NASA, DoD, State of NC, FEMA, Disney and CMS. As Principal of Baxter Warner Assoc., he is also under contract as historical interpreter on the Nature Bus of Norfolk.



Course Title: An Exploration Into the Power of Story

Date and Time: Thursday, April 27, 2023, 1:00 - 3:00

Location: TCC Va. Bch ONLY, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133), Not on Zoom

Course Description: Storytelling is one of the most powerful but undervalued communication tools in modern time. This presentation is intended to evoke memories and positive thoughts about people, places and things we remember. If you only recall a handful of past stories, this may be your inspiration to start writing. A simple, guided writing exercise will be included before your valued stories are lost or forgotten forever.

Speaker: Nanette Randall is an experienced interviewer, writer, project manager and personal historian. She specializes in building trust, documenting memoirs and teaching others about the importance of recording our lives. She is the author of *Memoirs by Design* and writes business histories, children's books, and pet stories.



Course Title: Let's Agree to Disagree

Date and Time: Monday, May 1, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: Conflict can make a tremendous difference between success and failure. Constructive conflict resolution can resolve problems that, left untouched, would erode your relationships or deprive you of greater happiness in the future. Within this lecture, Dr. Winfield will discuss the nature of conflict, explore conflict styles, and how they are influenced by gender and culture, and explore positive ways to resolve conflict while preserving the relationship.

Speaker: Dr. Chaniece Winfield has over 15 years of experience as a behavioral health practitioner specializing in providing substance abuse and mental health services to individuals and families across the lifespan. She is an undergraduate and graduate level educator in the counseling, psychology and human service disciplines and specializes in teaching and developing courses related to psychopathology, service interventions, ethics, and special populations. She currently serves as Human Services Online Program Director at ODU. Her expertise includes private and public service experience within outpatient, community and K-12 settings. She has several peer reviewed publications and is the recipient of several awards and honors locally at ODU and nationally.



Course Title: American Democracy: A Matter of Trust
Date and Time: Wednesday, May 3, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00
Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: The United States was founded by people with a healthy skepticism about government power who believed that too much trust in government would lead to bad government. Yet, current levels of trust are low and cynicism has replaced skepticism. This class examines what this means for American democracy and why it may fuel problems such as misinformation and electoral unrest. Finally, we will discuss what healthy levels of trust look like and what can be done to build them.

Speaker: Dr. Leslie Caughell is an Associate Professor of Political Science and Gender and Women’s Studies at Virginia Wesleyan University where she teaches courses in American Politics and political theory. Her research centers on demographic and environmental factors that shape political attitudes. She is the author of *Politics in the Era of Fake News*.

She was awarded an M.S. in European History from Old Dominion University and has taught advanced placement Modern European History at Nansemond Suffolk Academy from 2002 – 2010. She is active in her community, teaches yoga, and is mother to young children.



Course Title: **Urban Ecology**
Date and Time: Thursday, May 11, 2023, 1:00 – 3:00
Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: This lecture covers some of the fundamental principles of ecology, such as: life history patterns, island biogeography, food webs, etc. and presented within the context of urban ecosystems. It will also cover some of the ways that urban wildlife is studied, along with information on common urban wildlife species.

Speaker: **Dr. Shawn Dash** is presently an Assistant Professor of Biological Sciences at Hampton University. He is highly engaged in outreach regarding natural history and helping his listeners to enjoy nature and science.

Course Title: **The History of Apartheid in South Africa and How It Affected the People**
Date and Time: Thursday, May 18, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00
Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: This lecture will explain firsthand the racial makeup of apartheid in South Africa. The speaker will review the differences among the groups and how apartheid affected each group, including their standards of living. Examples of how each group lived, the hardships, and its true meaning will also be discussed. We will see through the eyes of a young White man and learn how his viewpoints differed from others. Ken will also discuss the resolution and its aftereffects.

Speaker: **Ken Reynolds** was born and raised in South Africa. His father was ex-military and transferred frequently. Ken was eight when he saw firsthand how the different races were treated while his father was employed by a mental asylum. Following high school he “fell for” a coloured woman, which ended due to apartheid. After graduating from university in South Africa, he taught at elementary and high schools. Ken and his family emigrated to the United States when he was in his mid-forties, first to Anchorage, Alaska, then to Virginia Beach. He returned to teaching prior to retiring. Ken is the author of the novel *Colour* which was published in 2022.



Course Title: What is 3-D Printing & Additive Manufacturing?

Date and Time: Wednesday, May 24, 2023, 10:00 – 12:00

Location: TCC Va Beach, Pungo Bldg Auditorium (F133) and ZOOM

Course Description: 3D printing technologies, also known as Additive Manufacturing (AM), are used to join materials layer by layer to make objects from 3D computer-aided design (CAD) model data. Through AM technology, complex geometric shapes, multi-material and multi-functional parts can be manufactured in a single operation. This lecture provides the basic principles of AM, the difference between traditional manufacturing processes, and recent advances in AM technologies. *TCC will provide a demonstration following the class. In-person attendance is suggested.*

Speaker: Dr. Hamid EisaZadeh is an assistant professor in the Mechanical Engineering Technology program at Old Dominion University. He has extensive experience teaching courses related to conventional and modern processes like welding and additive manufacturing. He obtained his Ph.D. degree in Mechanical Engineering from Clarkson University in 2017.
